The Smartphone Philosophy promotes smartphone-free childhoods while encouraging balanced, age-appropriate technology use. Families are encouraged to delay introducing smartphones until at least the first year of secondary school  . For safety and communication needs, simple "button phones", dumb phones, or smartwatches are recommended . These devices allow connectivity without exposing children to the risks of apps or online activities .

Key Commitments

- Delay Smartphones: Support delaying smartphone purchases until at least the first year of secondary school to encourage offline play and reduce online risks .
- Healthy Tech Use: Parents model balanced tech habits and enforce device-free times .
- Developing digital literacy in our school community: Educate children, parents and teachers with the latest resources to develop digital understanding and skills
- Community Advocacy: Build a collective movement for digital safety and mindfulness .

Key Beliefs

- Childhood is Precious: Offline play and real-world connections are vital for development .
- Balanced Tech Use: Technology should enhance, not replace, real-life experiences .
- Parental Empowerment: Equip families with tools for informed, values-aligned decisions .
- Reduced Peer Pressure: Avoid the status symbol mentality tied to smartphones .

- Positive Outcomes: Studies show delaying smartphones improves mental health and focus 🧠💡.
